"This has a certain beauty to it. I love the way the colours range from dark to light. I also love the way that other people may see it as grimy and disgusting but if you take it from a certain angle, it looks beautiful and inspiring. I love the way that it contrasts and might represent more than one thing so you can take it any way you like. For some people, it shows gloominess; for others change, because of the contrast of colours; and for some it could represent euphoria because of the light shade at the bottom of the photograph."

"Because of the way the tree stands out, it shows that in life, certain things are bold and make a difference. It can be viewed as eerily beautiful with a chilling perspective. However, it can also be viewed as bare, with no flowers, and could represent loneliness, gloominess and a sense of despair. It's boldness reminds me of people's personalities – from bold to shy – and because the background's grey and the tree's black, it shows how life can be magnificent but simple at the same time."




"Music and famous people inspire people: Music makes me feel better when I'm upset."


